

EMERGENCY WINTER WEATHER PLAN 2023-2024



Background

Every year, the Lexington-Fayette County Homelessness Response System meets and plans for all potential emergency shelter needs of those experiencing homelessness. This provides a coordinated response for times when extreme cold weather creates additional, immediate need for expanded capacity to assist those experiencing homelessness in Lexington.

Community response

The Lexington-Fayette County Homelessness Response System will activate its Emergency Winter Weather Plan and declare a "White Flag Day" when measures of extreme temperatures are reached or when other severe weather conditions take place. **Extreme temperature will be defined as any day/night when the temperature low is expected to fall below 32 degrees.**

The wind chill will not be taken into account in determining the temperature. Decisions about severe weather that takes place on days outside of extreme temperature situations will be made by the Office of Homelessness Prevention and Intervention in consultation with the appropriate authorities.

Any time a "White Flag Day" has been declared and the plan has been activated:

- The Office of Homelessness will notify local media, provide updates on social media, and notify all organizations that work with people experiencing homelessness;
- Emergency day centers and overnight shelters will welcome all persons, including former participants suspended for behavioral or programmatic reasons. Exceptions may include individuals suspended for violence and decisions will be made case-by-case;
- Shelter providers will expand capacity and operate overflow beds to the extent feasible;
- The OHPI will collaborate with providers and other resources to ensure emergency day shelter and overnight shelter are available for anyone in need.

Arbor Youth Services

Arbor Youth Services will continue to operate their emergency shelter with no extended capacity during the winter. Data shows that capacity for their birth to 17 years of age shelter will be sufficient as currently operating.

Arbor Youth Services will continue to operate their new emergency shelter with no extended capacity during the winter for unsheltered youth 18-24 years of age.

GreenHouse17 is the only domestic violence emergency shelter in Fayette County. All individuals will be provided case management and referral services including offers of permanent housing.

Hope Center

The Hope Center operates 160 beds on an average night, with an ability to expand to 180 beds in inclement weather. All individuals will be provided case management and referral services including offers of permanent housing while in the shelter.

The Hope Center will also operate a temporary winter shelter serving both adult men and adult women, included limited capacity to accommodate pets. The temporary shelter will operate 24/7 during the season and include access to bathrooms, showers, and meals. Individuals will have access to case management and referral sources via Hope Center staff and other community providers. On average, the temporary shelter will operate 160 beds.

The Salvation Army

The Salvation Army is a congregate shelter within Fayette County that is able to provide overnight emergency shelter for single adult women, single mothers with children, and single fathers with children. All individuals will be provided case management and referral services including offers of permanent housing while in the shelter.

The Salvation Army will make attempts to expand capacity within their facility located at 736 West Main Street, including the use of their lobby, hallways, and TV lounge, to accommodate those seeking shelter on cold nights. Individuals seeking shelter under this warming shelter model will not receive case management or service referrals.

Must follow all health and safety guidelines.

2023-2024 Winter Day Shelter

During the winter months, day time temperatures can remain under 32 degrees. The Lexington-Fayette County Continuum of Care recognizes that it is important to not only provide overnight shelter, but places that individuals and families can seek shelter during the day.

The following details several options for individuals and families to seek warmth, food, clothing, services, showers, bathrooms, and all other basic needs.

2023-2024 Winter Transportation and Street Outreach Services

Individuals and families without homes rarely have personal, reliable transportation. Many walk miles and miles a day just to access basic needs. With the weather turning colder, we recognize as a community that individuals that are already vulnerable are unable to walk those miles in the cold. We also recognize that some individuals do not have access to up-to-date weather reports to understand how cold it may become during the night. We also know that frost bite is the No. 1 discharge diagnosis to medical respite during the winter.

Due to these factors, community partners will facilitate transportation to shelter. Catholic Action Center will operate the Compassionate Caravan during extreme cold temperatures. Additionally, street outreach teams can help facilitate referrals and transportation to shelter.
